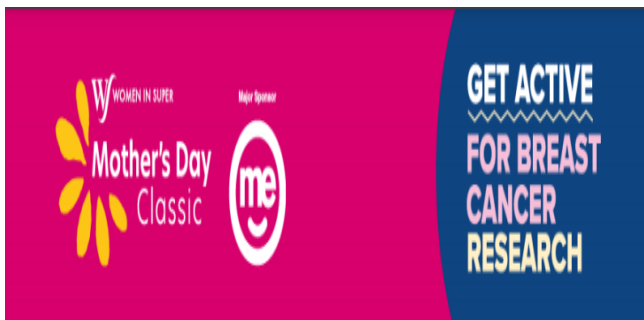

Integrated Community Bushfire Risk and Fuel Management Planning Project



During 2019 and 2020, Latrobe City Council has undertaken a Municipal Wide Bushfire Risk Assessment project. This project considers how together, both Land Use Planning and Fuel Management Treatments can serve to lower community exposure and risk of Bushfire.

This project will build on this knowledge gained through the detailed Bushfire Risk Assessment undertaken over the last 2 years and inform community based bushfire planning in 13 at risk communities in the Latrobe City municipality.

By working with each of the identified small township development associations and broader community to prepare cross tenure Individual Community Bushfire Protection Plans, the primary outcome of this project is to reduce fuel loads at a more localised scale for townships by implementing active fuel management strategies.

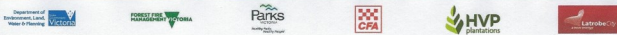

Toongabbie Township Group

WHAT WE ALREADY KNOW:

The exploration of example guidelines and methods have been undertaken by Latrobe City Council to reduce fuel loads at a more localised scale for township and settlements.

Fuel management actions are one of a suite of tools available to communities to increase their protection and resilience from bushfires. The Latrobe City Municipal Bushfire Risk Assessment recommends that Council undertake necessary planning to align fuel reduction works at township and property scale for all townships and settlements identified as being within extreme bushfire risk landscapes.

Latrobe City Council understands that the implementation of active fuel management within and surrounding settlements provides the opportunity to contribute to the following outcomes:

- The development or acknowledgement of 'safer centres' within towns or settlements where communities usually or traditionally gather
- Reduced exposure to bushfire for critical community assets including schools, shops, meeting places and homes
- Ensuring that critical community assets remain to support recovery after a fire
- A demonstration and strengthening of shared responsibility across all land managers
- Landowners and land managers who are better informed and empowered to act and understand the role of fuel management in landscape scale risk mitigation and how it integrates with other risk treatments undertaken in their locality
- Effective implementation of strategic, integrated fuel management across the landscape.

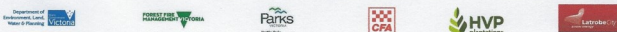
As part of this work, it will be necessary to consider all stakeholders, tenures, agencies, landowners and managers of land within the legislative, regulatory and planning context. In particular, bushfire management prevention works must take into account land use planning arrangements, statutory and other regulations which enable and control vegetation management across tenures.

PROJECT OUTCOMES

With the increasing risk of bushfires within the Latrobe City footprint, the need to collaboratively manage this risk through agency, Government and community partnerships is critical. The key tasks to this project include, but are not limited to:

- Review fuel management recommendations and opportunities identified in the Draft Latrobe City Municipal Bushfire Risk Assessment Report to inform stakeholder consultation regarding future land management practices and collaborative bushfire fuel management practices
- Socialise the completed assessments of bushfire risk for selected precincts to the community and develop corresponding fuel management plans specific to each necessary location
- Socialise and educate the community on necessary bushfire risk recommendations to underpin collaborative fuel management activities to be undertaken jointly by land managers.

NED STRINGER

The township of Toongabbie came into existence in 1863 when alluvial gold was discovered by Ned Stringer at Stringers Creek (Walhalla) in 1862.

Ned Stringer died at the age of 44 years in September 1863 without reaping the benefits of his discovery of gold. The reason for this is believed to be that gold had only just begun to be mined and perhaps because of his convict origin. Not a lot is known of his background and at various times he had used three different surnames. Macklesfield, Randel and Stringer. Apparently, this was not uncommon.

On 1st October 1863, an inquest before Dr. Alexander Arbuckle attributed his death to poor health and poverty-stricken circumstances. The inquest was held at Cowan's Accommodation House and Store/Hotel where Stringer (alias Macklesfield) had died. Stringer had been staying at Cowan's for the week before his death after arriving back from Sale where he had sought medical attention to treat a chest complaint.

Ann Cowan, William Robinson, and John Davis were present when Stringer died and gave evidence at his inquest. It was stated that Ned Stringer was restless and ill that night, wandering in and out of the kitchen seeking warmth and company. He applied a mustard poultice to his chest to draw out the congestion. Stringer believed he could no longer work at the diggings because the water did not agree with him.

Davis who was acquainted with Stringer for 12 to 15 months prior to his death, said that Stringer had complained of chest pains for the last two months. Ann Cowan heard Ned Stringer get out of bed during the night of the 29th to get a drink of water. When he did not answer her call out to him, she went to check and found him lying across his bed bleeding from the mouth. Both Davis and Robinson came to assist and realised he was dying.

Giving evidence at the inquest both Davis and Robinson and Constable Feeley, confirmed the absence of marks of violence. The jury foreman McQuilkin, questioned Davis carefully as the jury were interested to know if there had been a quarrel about gold. Constable Feeley had found 8 dwts of gold dust and a miner right in Stringers trouser pocket.

The jury found that Stringer died from excessive bleeding by the rupture of a blood vessel. Ned Stringer was buried on the day following the inquest, on 2nd October. About 16 miners made the trip down from the gold field to attend the funeral.

Ned Stringers bush grave was neglected in Toongabbie until his remains were finally re-interred in the Toongabbie Cemetery. Unfortunately, the site of his original grave was forgotten. When Stringer died there were no surveyed sections, allotments, or streets.

Controversy continued over a suitable monument for many years. It was 100 years after his discovery of gold that an appropriate memorial was eventually erected.

In 1888 when Toongabbie Streets were first named, Stringers Street was described as proceeding from the railway gates past Stringer's Grave to the boundary. Running north-south between Section 7 and 8. In 1970 when the Streets were renamed Stringers Street became Stringers Road.
