There are many apps available these days which support people to prepare for, and stay alert to, emergencies. They are free, easy to use and can make a big difference in a range of situations.

Below is a snapshot of what some of the Apps can offer to help you prepare for emergencies such as flood, fire and heatwaves and support resilience-building efforts in your area.

- ⇒ **VicEmergency** App provides information on all emergencies within Victoria and sends warnings to help you stay alert to emergencies that might affect you or others in your 'watch' zone'.
- ⇒ Emergency Plus allows you to dial emergency numbers such as 000 with your location detected to a 3 metre square reference
- ⇒ **Get Prepared** is a Red Cross app that guides you through preparing your own emergency plan, such as organizing your documents, key contacts and your emergency kit.
- ⇒ Airtasker is a mobile marketplace where you can seek support for property preparation from local people who can help. If you need help with gutter clearing, disposing green waste or mowing lawns, why not post a job on Airtasker for a price that works for you?
- ⇒ My Mizu maps where you can access freely available drinking water. On days of extreme heat, or if you are travelling to a new area, it helps to know where you can top up your water bottles and stay hydrated (and save from buying plastic bottles from stores).
- ⇒ ABC Listen allows you to listen to the radio through your phone or another device which could prove an invaluable back-up if your hand held radio dies or you don't want to drain your car battery. 100.7 FM and 828 AM are local stations which provide emergency updates.
- $\Rightarrow \qquad \mbox{There are many more, including WhatsApp, Attentis Smart Sensors} \\ (Latrobe Valley Information Network), Snap Send Solve and others. \label{eq:Latrobe}$

After a short break the Groups then participated in discussion led by Fire Risk Consultants who are drafting Community Bushfire Mitigation Plans across the Latrobe City, with priority areas chosen by the communities themselves. District Fires 1870—1939

his area has a long history of bushfires. While lightening has been the most common cause of fires over the past 20 years (Vic DSE-Wikipedia), it would appear that in the past deliberately lit fires were common. Since European settlement in the area selectors were frequently threatened by fires. Often because they burnt indiscriminately in the process of clearing the land regardless of the time of the year when the risk was very high. This area often provided/experiences the ideal conditions for bushfires. Low rainfall, dry sclerophyll forest, a combination of strong winds and high summer temperatures.

The most devasting fire in terms of their impact on communities and the environment were named after the day of the week in which they occurred.

Black Thursday 1851, Black Monday 1865, Black Sunday 1926, Red Tuesday 1898, Black Friday 1939, Ash Wednesday 1983 and Black Saturday 2009.

This area experienced bushfires in 1863, January 1875 and 1878-79 reported the worst fires seen at Eaglehawk. Selectors in the Toongabbie district included James Slater, James Rogers and Christian Christensen. The fire started at the foot of the ranges when selectors were burning scrub. Fanned by northerly winds the fire spread south, south-east and split into two fronts. One front burnt through James Roger's selection, then crossing Traralgon Road into Hugh Brown's selection. Pupils from the nearby Eaglehawk School saved Brown's house. The fire then burnt into J. Farmer's and E O'Meara's and caused the most damage to D. Kilmartin's property including his house. Firefighters stopped the fire before it burnt into J.D. Heywood's selection. They prevented the fire from continuing onto Rosedale.

New Year's Day 1884, fire burnt behind Toongabbie for a week before it stopped at the edge of the foothills to the north-west of the town. On the 9th January, it broke away again and burnt into Goodwin's property. On the 10th a back burn in Goodwin's paddock and along the road leading back into the ranges brought the fire under control.

Another fire driven by strong winds came down over the Walhalla Road, through Goodwin's and Buntines and then burnt through Scott's, Moore's and Nippe's properties spreading eastward to the railway line. Firefighters at great risk to themselves saved residents at these properties.

In 1890 a large bushfire was reported in the ranges.

1898-1901 regular bushfires broke out usually starting to the north or north west of Toongabbie. Farmers did not always give the required notice to adjoining landowners before burning off. Once burnt out many farmers struggled to re establish.

In February/March 1906 fires burnt to the north west of Toongabbie threatening re establishment of the farms in the hill country. Gadd, Ferguson and Goodwin 'bore the brunt' and fires burnt in the direction of the township. Difficult to comprehend why someone would decide to do a burn off in town while this bushfire threatened the town and properties.

Fires burnt to the north west of Toongabbie and Cowwarr in 1906. A wind change saved the town. 1908 another fire was recorded and in 1914 northerly wind fanned fires already alight in the hills to the north threatening many properties and the township.

Toongabbie escaped the devastation of the 1939 fires.

In November 1898 Ernest Scott, the 32 year old son of early selector Richard Scott, faced charges of deliberately lighting fires around Toongabbie. He was acquitted, much to the annoyance of local property owners who had to contend with deliberately lit fires in the area. In December 1901 at the Traralgon Police Court Ernest Scott was declared insane. Ernest Scott was admitted to the Kew Asylum in 1901. He was 35 years old. He escaped and arrived back in Toongabbie in 1902. Recaptured nine days later he was returned to Kew. He remained at Kew until 1907. He died at Beechworth in 1932 in the hospital for the insane.

Bushfires and the threat of fire will continue to have an impact on our community. Our climate is becoming more variable and people are living close to a fire-prone forested area. Fires have been and continue to be a threat to the communities in this area. Fires also play a role in forest re generation. They are a feature of the Victorian ecosystem and part of the environment in which we live in and will continue to drive us to adapt.
